Easter TCF News 2016

Between 29 August and 7 September 2015 Rev John Ruhle, Minister at The Gap Uniting Church, led 14 Australians on a tour of the projects TCF is involved in as well as a 3 day hike up Mount Ramelau. Once more, the Bacon family offered their home as the group's accommodation and Rob Williams and Catharina Williams-van Klinken were invaluable as tour guides and interpreters. The following are stories from two of the participants.

Timor Children's Foundation Dental Project

Dr Malcolm Campbell sends his sincere thanks to everyone who helped over the past two years to make the first Dental Project trip to East Timor a success. People assisted not only financially but in their willingness to share the vision for the project and make it become a reality.

The fundraising for the project was launched in January 2015. Dr Campbell was able to purchase the materials and equipment required to provide the service for the children through \$16,000 in cash donations and an estimated \$4000 worth of direct donations of materials, equipment and services.

A full detailed report is available on the TCF website however in summary it's pleasing to report that the aims of the project were met. The team was able to examine and treat 45 people. All of the children presently living at Samaria were seen and treated as well as some from the neighbourhood. The priority was to treat any pain and discomfort and secondly to treat definitively all adult teeth and that meant placing permanent restorations or extracting un-restorable teeth. A child presented saying that he hadn't slept for the last few nights because of pain. Unfortunately he had two adult teeth that needed extracting.

I'm not sure how he would have coped if we had not been there. Quite a number of other children required very deep fillings. If we had not been able to treat these children they too would have been experiencing pain and infection in the coming weeks and months.



The children were great in the chair. They were very co-operative and generally happy to have us working on them, which is a credit to how Filomena is raising them. The team spent the first day we were there playing games, colouring in and singing which built rapport.

Where to from here? The equipment is being stored in Dili ready for another team to continue the dental care of the children – but that's not all. Since this mode of delivery of dental treatment has had its initial success the hope is that the team can extend the service to meet the needs of more people. There are many hurdles in extending the service but Malcolm is confident the challenge will be worth it. Please keep the development of this project in your prayers.


The Scholarship Project

During our Bridge the Gap trip we had the opportunity to meet with Moises de Silva and 20 of the scholarship students supported by Timor Children's Foundation. The team shared our stories about the many different ways we had raised funds for TCF. Then each scholarship student told us about where they were from in Timor Leste and what they are studying. They are studying a range of qualifications including Public Health, Computing, Education, Agriculture and a range of trade qualifications including car mechanic, bricklaying, electrician and carpentry.

This is Marchel Monteiro. He is now working at the Hosanna church training centre in Dili. Marchel spoke about the difficulties he was having when his parents couldn't send any more money for him to study. Marchel said that when he was offered the scholarship he didn't have to worry any more and he could now think about what to do next. He had no idea how he would have continued to study without a TCF scholarship. Marchel said he was very pleased

to meet friends from Australia and thanked us for sharing our stories about raising money. Marchel would be very interested in building links between Hosanna church and churches in Australia.

Another student asked why we couldn't support students to study in Australia. We had to explain how expensive it is to study here compared to Timor (\$150-300 per semester vs \$15,000 approx).



Visit to Samaria Children's home

The Bridge the Gap team also visited the Samaria Children's home. The purpose of our visit was three-fold. The visit was a chance for the dental team to prepare for their dental clinic later in the week, an opportunity for the team to meet Filomena de Vasconcelos and the children, and time for John and Liz to talk with Filomena about how the renovations were progressing and any other needs the Home has.

Our visit began with play time with some of the children where they completed colouring sheets that the dental team used later in the week to both identify the children and communicate with them about dental care.

The children then gathered and sang a series of songs for us that they had recently sung at a choral event. Their choir leader is Maria Theresa (aged 14).



Then it was time for games. The Bridge the Gap team

introduced a range of new games to the kids. It was good to see all the kids and many of the team joining in.

We also had the opportunity to see the renovations that have been completed. Filomena is very pleased with the new covered outdoor area for the kids, which is almost completed. The next challenge is the lack of a consistent water supply in the dry season, which most likely means a new pump for the well. We were also very impressed with how clean and tidy Samaria was looking, and how happy and healthy the

children were. Filomena very clearly cares deeply for the children. Our visit ended with a sumptuous afternoon tea.
